7. Secretary-Treasurer's Report (Saba)

Saba: Presented financial reports to membership. September Donations included Chris Thompson - Skills for Life Inc. - Donation to Federation of Black Canadians for Impact Gala: \$500.00; Katie Krelove - Reimbursement for bus from Hamilton for Grassy Narrows River Run: \$500.00; Sexual Assault Centre (Hamilton and Area) - GMM Donation to Take Back The Night: \$500.00; and Josh Kitchen - Replacement Cheque Reimbursement for Encampment Support Expenses: \$191.50

The local is in a good financial standing. We posted a small deficit of -\$1,860.32 this month. This is because the first dues deposits in September are always smaller than normal, because not all members have returned to work. Now that they all have returned to work, we should no longer post deficits or retain a negative equity. The orientation notebooks that we handed out at orientation this year were much more expensive than anticipated because we were initially quoted the cost for a different style of notebook than the ones delivered. We will bring a motion to the next GMM to adjust the budget to reflect actual expenditure.

8. Communications and Bills

Brad: We've received appreciation from payees from our previous month's donations.

Hamed: Question for Saba - were reimbursements processed for stewards?

Saba: Yes, they should be getting them soon.

9. Executive Committee Report

Rand: Executive reports are largely not given orally, but they are on the website. (Executive reports can be <u>found here</u>)

Bonnie: Highlights from the Heath and Safety officer's report that Reza requested we share:

"About the last issue regarding 'CA's fear of reprisal' – emphasized during the Ministry of Labour, Immigration, Training and Skills Development - Field Visit occurred in 25th Sept. 2024. I attended the meeting and shared my views and understanding with the inspector. The employer is reminded that REPRISALS BY EMPLOYER IS PROHIBITED under Section 50 of the Occupational Health and Safety Act.50.(1) No employer or person acting on behalf of an employer shall:

- o dismiss or threaten to dismiss a worker
- discipline or suspend or threaten to discipline or suspend a worker
- o impose any penalty upon a worker; or
- o intimidate or coerce a worker,

I have also been dealing with the 'Mould in undergraduate residences' issue. Our union members and staff are aware and very concerned about this, and I have shared some of our concerns with UHS. It was discussed during the central meetings, but unfortunately, no actions/plans emerged from our discussions that established a proper remedy for our complaints. I request all our members to record and share issues with us by emailing healthandsafety@cupe3906.org. One can take pictures and send them to us with location details and when the image was taken. This severe problem affects all our members and others coming to McMaster. Together, we can address this and find a remedy."

Caleb: this info is also in my exec report, if you can send the email to me as well at leadsteward_reslife@cupe3906.org, that would be great as we are working on getting this solved and evidence is appreciated.

10. Reports of committees and delegates

a. Steward Networks **(Chaired by: Rebecca, Hamed, Bita, and Caleb)**Hamed: Ongoing unit 2 bargaining support process. They had a meeting with the employer in October, including a proposal for wage increase, seniority, etc. and the employer submitted their

response. They are working to continue negotiation. MEeting again this Friday to negotiate the collective agreement.

Brad: Neither Mason nor Varsha are present, but they have done some door to door knocking. Much of the focus has been on Unit 2 Bargaining mobilization.

Mary Ellen: We prepared mail outs for unit 2 members last week plus general info about benefits. Things will speed up soon with negotiating, so we'll keep everyone updated.

Rand: This committee now encompasses Raise the Floor as well.

Jeff: Unit 2 will be meeting with employer on Friday and again next week on the 4th or 5th. It is going slow at the moment but we're making some headway on non-monetary issues so far and moving quickly into monetary issues. Look for the mailers for more specific updates, and there will be more online and through physical mail.

Brad: A big issue was job security and to strengthen language in the agreement. The employer has expressed unwillingness to move on job security and unreasonably large workloads. Providing meaningful TA support is also an issue getting resistance from the employer. Have focused mostly on non-monetary asks but getting there.

Caleb: Not too much of an update, but we're meeting weekly and have started to actually draft proposals! Hopefully more updates soon.

a. Let it be resolved that the local provides additional transitional executive honorarium to outgoing executive members.

Carolyn moves, Caleb seconds

Brad: Context - depending on the position, often the previous exec will stick around to help mentor and onboard the new exec. Eric is outgoing treasurer and is still in office on a near daily basis working with Saba. Executive has already passed motion to give Eric \$500 but exec is limited on how much we can spend. We're hoping to provide Eric with an honorarium (\$250) for this month, and also pay him for any month he is working on the transition.

b. Let it be resolved that the local elect 8 delegates (and spend \$900 total) to attend the Samuel Lawrence Dinner at the Workers Arts & Heritage Centre on Nov. 8th.

Kusum moves, Bita seconds

Brad: Context - WAHC keeps labour history alive in Hamilton. The Samuel Lawrence dinner is their biggest fundraiser of the year. Our local has historically bought a table with 8 seats, tickets are not really elected, but just reach out and it will be on a first come/first serve basis. Good dinner and entertainment!

c. Let it be resolved that the local elect 4 delegates to attend the CALM conference in Hamilton on Nov. 4th.

Kusum moves, Caleb seconds

Brad: Context - CALM is the Canadian Association of Labour Media. They help unions be more effective at comms and are having a mini conference in November. The 4 slots would first go to comms committee going on behalf of the local, and if there are extra spots then reach out to attend.

Kusum: Oluwadamilola Babatunde would be great to add to the list of attendees, she asked me to put her name forward.

Rand: There are only 3 of us on comms regularly, so I'm sure she'll be able to attend.

Motion Passes

d. Let it be resolved that the local donate \$500 to the strike fund at Western University. *Caleb moves, Bonnie seconds*

Brad: These are for the strike funds of local 2361 who was just on strike for 4-5 weeks, so obviously their account takes a hit. To be clear, this is to the local, none of it goes to Western.

Rand: We should support this, I used to work at Western but quit partway into my contract because Western treats their employees so badly. I would like to support these workers.

Motion passes

e. I (Bonnie Evans) move that the local donate \$500 to Spring Magazine to support organizing costs and Red October conference costs.

Bita seconds

Bonnie: Spring largely does online journalism and has published several articles that concern our union, including work on the 10 Bay residences and tenant organizing with our union, as well as reporting on our most recent unit 1 strike. They just had a conference this weekend that included Fred Hahn and JP Hornick, Matt Green from Hamilton Centre and others. They incurred a lot of costs bringing people in from as far as Vancouver, and I think it would be good to support their costs and work since it's volunteer/member-run.

Ori: I am against this and hope that everyone will be against this. This magazine is normalizing the glorification of terrorism in Canada and the union needs to stop giving money to these kinds of things.

Motion passes

Ori: Question - despite the fact that this kind of thing was democratically elected, it is against the values that we are supposed to hold. How can we deal with that?

Rand: This is a GMM - I know you may not like the outcome but people voted, this is the GMM.

Hamed: I will ask Ori - do you have evidence that this Spring magazine supports terrorism or is against human rights?

Ori - I said "normalizing."

Rand: I know that you want to have this conversation, but maybe we can move this to the chat so we can move on.

f. Let it be resolved that the local purchase (number) tickets to *peace love (unicorns)* & *communism*, *the homegrown chronicle of a decade of movements at McMaster University* screening Fri Oct 25th at the Westdale.

Brad: Not a specific amount of tickets; we can determine how many.

Rand: This is a film made by McMaster students on activism at Mac. I was interviewed and others in CUPE were as well. This was great, and I know they worked hard so I'm really proud and support this.

Cyril moves for 10 tickets, Bonnie seconds.

g. Let it be resolved that the local donate \$500 to CUPE 5399's (South Riverdale Community Health Centre) hardship fund ahead of their strike deadline at the end of the month.

Bonnie: This was actually sent to me by Rebecca. This was a specific request from their local, it would be a good show of solidarity if we donated.

h. Let it be resolved that the local spend up to \$500 on posters and stickers for local stewards to post on their desks and office doors so other members can identify their department stewards.

Rand: This sounds like a good idea so that they are identifiable.

Jeff: This is from Rebecca again. The rationale is explained in the motion itself, it helps members ID stewards and it was brought up by a steward and designed by comms team. This is something we should do more of!
